

# Second Grade Summer Reading 2022


### Expectations for students entering 2<sup>nd</sup> grade:

Students entering second grade should read three books that they haven't previously read. Two of the books should be fiction books, with at least one of the two being a chapter book\*. The third book should be a non-fiction book.

#### Assignment for fiction books:

Students should complete a summary chart (see sample below) for both of their fiction books. Copies of the chart templates can be downloaded from the Summer Reading section under the "Parents" tab on the GCA website.

#### Assignment for non-fiction book:

On a piece of notebook paper, students should write the title of their non-fiction book and three interesting facts that they learned from the book. Facts should be written in their neatest handwriting using complete sentences.

Summer reading assignments are due **Friday**, **September 2**, **2022**. Students will receive one grade for each assignment, resulting in three grades in the "Other Reading" section of their Reading grade. Please contact the Foundations and Bridge Academy Office if you have any questions.
